Deaconesses Trained to Reach Out in Love and Share Christ

Caring For and Sharing Christ with Hurting People Concordia Seminary, St. Louis — \$100,000

2021–2023 Biennium Mission Goal: \$2,150,000 Mission Grant #14 \$100,000

As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace: whoever speaks, as one who speaks oracles of God; whoever serves, as one who serves by the strength that God suppliesin order that in everything God may be glorified through Jesus Christ. To him belong glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen (1 Peter 4:10-11).

Deaconesses are professional church workers trained to the share the Gospel of Jesus Christ through works of mercy, spiritual care, and teaching the Christian faith. Equipped with God's Word, deaconesses share the Good News of Jesus Christ with those who have not yet heard it. In reaching out to those in need, deaconesses continually point them toward the cross.

Deaconesses may serve in the parish, in institutions, or in the mission field. Their specific ministries change depending on their call, but all deaconesses reach out and care for others as they share the love of Christ. They lovingly and selflessly provide much-needed care and works of mercy to people who are suffering and often marginalized. These include people who are sick, homeless, disabled, malnourished, homebound or hospitalized, enduring grief or loss, in hospice care, or living in nursing homes or convalescent homes. They also may serve those who are mentally ill, troubled youth, teen mothers, children of divorce, and those suffering from neglect or domestic violence.

The deaconess certificate is awarded to women in various ways. Some women complete the three-year residential program at Concordia Seminary or the dual degree program while also studying at St. Louis University. Some women receive their training and certification by participating in a four-year distance course study through Center for Hispanic Studies (CHS) or Ethnic Immigrant Institute of Theology (EIIT). Starting in the spring of 2021, women can become certified as they study four years in their home area through the online deaconess studies program.

Deaconesses serving in a parish may visit shut-ins or make hospital calls. They may manage the Sunday School program, lead women's' Bible studies, and work with the youth. Regardless of how they serve, they listen and grow to understand the needs of those they serve.

Some deaconesses may serve as a hospital chaplain or work in an institution that is a Recognized Service Organization of the LCMS. They may serve as counselors at a center for troubled youth or minister to unwed mothers who learn to care for their child.

Deaconesses, who are recent immigrants to the United States, use their languages skills and understanding of different cultures to help people assimilate into this country. They understand the struggles immigrants are facing and keep pointing them to the loving arms of Christ.

The money from this grant will help fund scholarships for the training of women to become certified deaconesses. It will also cover some of the costs of managing the deaconess training program at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis.

William Walsham How (1823 - 1897)

William Walsham How was born into a wealthy British home just before Christmas in 1823. His father was a lawyer and his grandfather a preacher. William attended Oxford to study law, but after graduation he entered the Anglican ministry. He proved very capable and was offered the Bishopric of Manchester; but he turned it down without even telling his family of the offer. He also refused the Bishopric of Durham, England, with its large salary and prestige. He wanted to serve in humbler places.

In 1851, he became a country parson in the rural parish of Whittington near the Welsh border. He labored there for twenty-eight years, during which time he wrote most of his nearly sixty hymns. In 1879, he moved to London and began working tirelessly among the poor as an assisting (suffragen) Bishop.

He was called the "Omnibus Bishop" for he refused to ride in the private coach afforded bishops. He preferred public transportation. He was also called "the Poor Man's Bishop" because of his concern for the poverty-stricken of Victorian London.

William tended toward liberalism in his theology and was influenced by the intellectual trends of his day, including the theory of evolution. His son once said, "My father considered evolution to be the wonderful way in which the Lord formed man out of the dust of the ground."

Nevertheless, William was a passionate soul-winner and an evangelical hymnist. He once said a minister "should be a man pure, holy, and spotless in his life; a man of much prayer; in character meek, lowlydevoting his days and nights to lightening the burdens of humanity." And he said about his poems: "A good hymn should be like a good prayer—simple, real, earnest, and reverent."

In 1897, How was asked to write the national hymn for the British Empire's observance of Queen Victoria's Jubilee, but he had little time to enjoy the honor. He died on August 10 that year while vacationing in Ireland.

One of William's greatest hymns is "For All the Saints," originally titled "Saints Day Hymn—Cloud of Witnesses—Hebrews 12:1." It was written for All Saints' Day (November 1) and is often used as a processional in church services on that day due to its majestic tune. It was first published in 1864 in Earl Nelson's Hymns for Saint's Days and Other Hymns.

For all the saints Who from their labors rest, Who Thee by faith before the world confessed, Thy name, O Jesus, be forever blest. Alleluia! Alleluia!

From earth's wide bounds and ocean's far thest coast,
Through gates of pearl streams in the countless host.
Singing to Father, Son and Holy Ghost.






