That which is worth doing is worth preparing for.

The season of Lent begins March 2. As usual, it snuck up on me this year.

Lent is time of preparation. Sometimes people think of it as a kind of spiritual "shape up and slim down." Like taking on a new exercise routine or diet, Lent is a time in the church year when people might take up some new devotional routine or fast in certain ways, giving up a favorite food, TV, or some other pleasure. The assumption is that we'll be better, more spiritual people by learning about and exercising our willpower over our typical enslavement to earthly, material appetites.

But does any of this work?

Sure, it may be healthy to give up certain kinds of junk food and any time we spend in the Word of God is always beneficial, but none of it can produce even the slightest change in our relationship with God. These are just human works. This view of Lent is based on a false assumption that you can overcome sin and failure by trying harder and being holier. But behavior modification doesn't bring salvation. All this is based on a belief that the opposite of sin is "being good" or "doing right."

But that is certainly not the biblical view.

Instead, in the Bible sin is seen as a matter of distance or separation. It is a state of being apart from God, living out of harmony or out of unity with the One who is the only truth and meaning there is to life. The bad behaviors we typically think of as sins are actually the symptoms of it. And there's only one cure and it's not being "good." The cure is receiving the reconciliation that only Jesus Christ can give to us as a free gift of grace.

Lent is a time to discover anew what this means. Bible study and worship will help with this, not as works we do to make up for our sin, but as time spent reflecting on the great truth of the Gospel and its reality for you. Indeed, this is how we prepare ourselves, for that which is worth doing is worth preparing for.



Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits: who forgives all your iniquities, who heals all your diseases. Psalm 103:2-3

J. C. Penney, who descended from a long line of Baptist preachers, was well on his way to establishing a successful career when the 1929 Great Depression threw him into crisis. His business deals turned sour, and Penney became overwhelmed with anxiety and insomnia. He developed a painful case of shingles and was hospitalized, but tranquilizers and drugs only made things worse. His mental state deteriorated until, as he later said, "I was broken nervously and physically, filled with despair, unable to see even a ray of hope. I had nothing to live for. I felt I hadn't a friend left in the world, that even my family turned against me."

But one morning he heard singing coming from the little hospital chapel. The words of the song said, "Be not dismayed whate'er betide / God will take care of you."


Entering the chapel, he listened to the song, to the Scripture reading, and to the prayer. "Suddenly—something happened. I can't explain it. I can only call it a miracle. I felt as if I had been instantly lifted out of the darkness of a dungeon into warm brilliant sunlight." All worry left him as he realized more fully than he had ever imagined just how much the Lord Jesus Christ cared for him. From that day J. C. Penney was never plagued with worry, and he later called those moments in the chapel as, "the most dramatic and glorious twenty minutes of my life." He later became one of America's greatest retail merchants.



On a Sunday in 1904, Civilla Martin was in Lestershire, New York, where her husband, Walter, was compiling a collection of hymns for the Practical Bible Training School. They were planning to travel to another town that day, for Martin had a preaching assignment. Civilla woke up sick, and Martin was about to cancel his plans, when their young child piped up and said: "Oh, Daddy, you don't have to stay home because of mother—God will take care of us."

Martin proceeded to the train station and fulfilled his appointment, When he returned, Civilla handed him the words of "God Will Take Care of You," which she had written in his absence. Going to his little organ, Martin composed the music, and it was first published in the songbook he was compiling for the school.





Witnesses to Christ: People from His Passion

John tells us why he wrote his Gospel: "Jesus did many other signs in the presence of the disciples, which are not written in this book; but these are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in His name" (John 20:30 –31). Life! When we believe that Jesus is the Christ, God gives us life—abundant life, forgiven life, and eternal life.

Historically, the Fourth Gospel is likened to an eagle—an image that suggests John soars to heights of glory and grandeur. That's because the evangelist paints a stunning portrait of Jesus, who is the bread of life, the resurrection and the life, and the way, the truth, and the life. Life in Jesus. That's God's gift to you!

This Lent, our life in Christ will be strengthened as we hear the witness of those in John's Gospel who journeyed to the cross. Along the way, we'll meet villains, such as Barabbas and Pontius Pilate, as well as sinners, such as Peter (who denied Jesus *three* times), Mary Magdalene (who was possessed by *seven* demons), and Judas Iscariot (who betrayed Jesus for *thirty* pieces of silver).




Spreading the Word of God to Russian People

Training Pastors to Serve the Church in Russia Lutheran Theological Seminary, Novosibirsk, Siberia — \$100,000

"and what you

have heard from

me in the presence

of many witnesses

(Timothy 2:2).

Through the efforts of the Siberian Evangelical Lutheran Church, which is in full altar and pulpit fellowship with the LCMS, and through the pastoral training provided by the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Novosibirsk, Siberia, the Word and Sacraments are again making their way to the long-repressed Russian people.

The Novosibirsk seminary's goal is to prepare workers to spread the true Word of God to the Russian people. To do so, pastors must be well educated and prepared to provide intelligent, compassionate pastoral care to everyone. Because of changing financial circumstances within the seminary's largest supporting organization, the U.S. foundation has reduced its contribution to the seminary's operations.

This grant will help keep the seminary in operation for the next two years, as the Siberian Lutheran Mission, an LCMS Recognized Service Organization (RSO), continues its "Save the Seminary Campaign" to raise funds to endow the seminary's operations long-term.

We Pray Together:

Heavenly Father, You are our hope and salvation. You have called workers to serve in Your harvest fields. The seminary in Novosibirsk is preparing these workers to take the true Word to the people of Russia. Grant that these mite offerings may enable the seminary to continue its operations as additional long-term funding is sought. In Jesus' precious name, Amen.


